

The painting of the Mona Lisa eventually went to the king of France and never to her husband. It can now be found in Le Louvre, Paris, France. Its other name is La Gioconda.

Fencers of Æthelmearc

Many of you may be aware of what started as an April fools joke on my part and turned into a serious discussion.

From that discussion, and from what I have seen in Æthelmearc in the past few years, it has become obvious to me that the time has come to make this change.

While there is a place for light rapier, and it has its fans, the fact remains that most tournaments these days are fought with heavy rapier, and heavy rapier is the weapon on the field at Pennsic. With that in mind, and after consultation with their Majesties, the Earl Marshal, and the upper level fencing marshalate I am making this change.

Starting Jun 15, 2011 Æthelmearc will be a heavy rapier default kingdom.

The following changes will be then made to the Æthelmearc Policies of the Marshal of Fence:

II. C. 2. Strike the phrase "if heavy rapiers are used." Additional throat protection is now required.

V. 5. will now read:

- 5. All fencers must authorize in single Heavy Rapier as their first weapons form. After that, authorizations for other weapons forms may be attempted in any order.
- a. Light Rapier authorization will consist of single light rapier, after the first authorization is obtained, the fencer may fence light rapier in any form in which they are authorized in heavy rapier.

Note that all fencers currently holding a light authorization will retain it and need not re-authorize, but those who do not yet have a heavy rapier authorization are to be given a six month period after June 15th in which to get one. I am publishing this here so that when the changes are published in the Æstel, and made official, it does not come as a surprise.

I feel that this puts the Æthelmearc rules more in line with what is happening in the Æthelmearc and SCA rapier community now, and what has been happening on the field, but still preserves light rapier for those who wish to play with them.

Thank you all for your feedback on this matter, and thank you to those who I sought for counsel.

What this means: Light rapiers (foil and epee) will not be outlawed, they will just be pushed to the back seat of fencing. If you wish to authorize (and fence in tournaments, melees or at demos) you must first authorize in heavy rapier. Once you have authorized in heavy rapier, you can then authorize in light rapier.

Unfortunately this technique hasn't lasted the test of time and it has deteriorated over the centuries. It can now be found at the Convent of Sta Maria delle Grazie, Milan in Italy.

From the North: Follow I-79 South to Exit 73, PA-910 Wexford. Turn left onto PA-910 E. Wexford/Bayne Road. Follow briefly (~0.2 miles) and turn right onto Brandt School Road. Brandt School Road changes names to W. Ingomar Road. After following both for approximately 3 miles, stay straight to go onto Highland Road.


** Follow ~0.7 miles, then turn left to stay on Highland Road. Follow Highland for ~1.2 miles and turn left into the parking lot, just before Highland Road runs into Old Perry Highway.

From the South: Follow I-79 North to Exit 68, Mt. Nebo Road. Turn right off the ramp onto Mt. Nebo and follow approximately 1.7 miles. Turn left onto Arndt Road. In less than a mile, you will turn left onto Reis Run Road. All of these follow the Yellow Belt and you might see small signs with a yellow dot. Follow Reis Run for approximately 2.4 miles and turn right onto Highland Road. Continue from ** above.

From the East: Take best route towards Pittsburgh, and get into Route 376 West. Follow Route 376 to Exit 72B, Blvd of the Allies. Follow Blvd of the Allies almost 1 mile, and get into the right-hand lane following the signs for I-579 North (Veteran's Bridge). Cross over the Veteran's Bridge and merge left onto I-279 North. Follow approximately 2.7 miles and take Exit 4, McKnight Road. Take the McKnight Road ramp. Follow McKnight 1.5 miles to the West View/Millvale turnoff. Game of the Month: Knucklebones by Dagonell the Juggler

Playing with knucklebones is an ancient pastime. The British Museum has two sculptures in its collection which are pictured with this article. The first is two girls playing with knucklebones. It was made in Greece, approximately 330 B.C. The second is two boys fighting with knucklebones at their feet suggesting that the fight may have been over a game of knucklebones. The statue is from 1st century Rome.





The name 'knucklebones' is a slight misnomer. The actual bones involved are the ankle bones or 'tali' of a sheep. They have four long sides; flat, concave, convex, and sinuous, between two rounded ends. When rolled, the bones seldom land on the rounded ends. Values may be assigned to each long side and they may be played like a dice game. The third illustration is a pair of actual sheep's "knucklebones".



The game is mentioned in a letter by the Roman Emperor Augustus which is quoted by Suetonius (Augustus 71,1ss). The sides had the values 1, 3, 4, and 6. The highest possible throw is a "Venus", named after the Roman Goddess of Love and consisted of each of four dice showing a different side. The first player to throw a Venus, wins the pot. Other throws were named after other Roman gods and heroes, but no mention is made of their values or combinations. Four one's is called a 'canis' or 'dog' and anyone throwing one must add a denarius (small silver coin) to the pot. A lone six, not including a Venus, is a 'senio' and the penalty is the same. Little else of the game is known.

In "Traditional Games of England, Scotland and Ireland", the sheep's ankle bones are called "hucklebones" and are used to play "Fivestones". The description of Fivestones is nearly identical to the modern game of "Jacks" with the substition of a knucklebone for the rubber ball and not allowing it to touch the ground. The fourth illustration is a detail from Brugel's _Children's Games_ which was painted in 1560. Given that there are only three bones on the ground and one little girl is throwing a bone up, it's more likely that they're playing "Fivestones" instead of "Knucklebones".



From Gomme's description of "Fivestones": "He took all five pieces in the palm of the hand first, then threw them up and caught them on the back of the hand, and then from the back of the hand into the palm. Four of the stones were then thrown on the ground; the fifth was thrown up, one stone being picked up from the ground, and the descending fifth stone caught in the same hand; the other three pieces were next picked up in turn. Then two then three, then all four at once, the fifth stone being thrown up and caught on the back of the hand, and then thrown from the back and caught in the palm. When he dropped one, he picked it up between his outstretched fingers while the other stones remained on the the back of the hand; then he tossed and caught it likewise. Then after throwing up the five stones and catching them on the back of the hand and the reverse, all five being kept in the palm, one was thrown up, and another deposited on the ground before the descending stone was caught. This was done to the three others in turn. Then with two at a time twice, the one and three, then all four together, then from the

palm to the back of the hand, and again to the palm. This completed one game. If mistakes were made, another player took the stones. Marks were taken for successful play."

Recipe of the Month By Dagonell the Juggler

From: A Boke of Cookrye by A.W. (1584)

A Pudding in a Tench

Take your tench and drawe it very clene and cut it not over lowe. Then take beets boyled, or Spinage, and chop it with yolks of hard Eggs, Corance, grated Bread, Salt, Pepper, Sugar and Sinamon, and yolks of rawe Egges, and mingle it togither, and put it in the Tenches belly. Then put it in a platter with faire water and sweet butter and turn it in the Platter and set it in the Oven, and when it is inough: serve it with sippets and poure the licour that it was boiled in upon it.

Translations: Tench is a member of the Carp family. It generally yields about 4-5 pounds of meat. 'Serve it with sippets' means serve over toast. Everything else is pretty much straightforward. If you don't recognize a term, say it out loud, so Sinamon is cinnamon.

- 1 lb perch fillets
- 1 cup frozen spinach
- 2 eggs
- 2 tablespoons currants
- 1/4 cup bread crumbs
- 1/8 teaspoon each of salt, pepper, sugar and cinnamon.
- 1 cup cooking sherry
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 2 slices of bread

Boil one egg in about two cups of water. When the egg is cooked, take the egg out and boil the spinach until done. Melt the butter. Drain the spinach and add the hard-boiled egg yolk, currants, bread crumbs, salt, pepper, sugar, cinnamon, and raw egg yolk. Blend well. Lay the fillets in a baking dish and baste with melted butter. The original recipe called for stuffing the fish, but I was working with fillets, so I spread the mixture across them. Pour the cooking sherry over the fish and sauce. Bake uncovered at 400 for 1 hour. Serve over toast.

This recipe was absolutely heavenly. I will be making it again, and soon!

ADDITIONAL LEONARDO DA VINCI TRIVIA

Because Leonardo was born out of wedlock he was not permitted a university education nor to follow in his father's footsteps by becoming a lawyer. Instead he trained in the workshop system in Florence serving his apprenticeship under the artist Andrea del Verrocchio as well as Lorenzo di Credi and Pietro Perugino. Leonardo Da Vinci learnt to create metalwork, sculpture, decorative woodcarving, church and military banners, medals, shields, embroidery designs.

His mentor, Verrocchio, knew that his apprentice had become greater than him when Leonardo Da Vinci contributed to Verrocchio's painting for the friars of Vallombrosa, The Baptism Of Christ, by painting a figure of an angel and the landscape. This can be seen at the front of the painting and his finer brushwork and blending is more noticeable. Verrocchio vowed never to paint again because his apprentice's artwork was much better.

Leonardo Da Vinci was a Renaissance Man - skilled in several disciplines which included painting, sculpting, engineering, anatomy, geometry, music, the future and inventing. Though at times he could also be easily distracted and often left work unfinished and would have to be reminded by clients to finish commissioned work. He was a much in demand as an artist and amongst his clients were the King of France who commissioned him to paint for his court. Princes would commission him as a military engineer and in contrast he would also work for the Church.

Leonardo Da Vinci would fill in notebooks with many designs, which included ideas for a tank, machine gun, parachute, a submarine, the use of solar energy, the calculator, the first robot, helicopter, hang glider, and a bicycle. His notebooks would be crammed full of drawings and sketches - probably because paper was so expensive and could not be wasted.
