From the North and all entrances from Canada; Make your best route to the NYS I-190 south bound. Travel south to the porter Ave. exit. Exit there and turn left onto Porter Ave. travel up Porter to Niagara St. Turn left at Niagara St. and go 1 block to Connecticut St. Turn Right (at the really big castle) and you are at the entrance to the Armory.

From the South: Make your best route to NYS I-190 north bound. Travel north to Niagara St. exit(exit 8) follow the ramp to Niagara St. and turn left. Travel ¾ of a mile to Connecticut St. Turn right (at the really big castle) and you are at the entrance to the Armory.

Salon

What of these Salons at Ice Dragon?

So as to avoid any wide spread concern or panic, I begin this by pointing out so that there will be plenty

of space, tables and seating at Ice Dragon that comes with the price of admission.

What is a salon? Quick research of "what is a salon" informed me that it was invented by the Italians, adapted by the French and has been at the center of entertaining, style, philosophy and cultural and political movement. One dictionary described it as, " 1. A large room, such as a drawing room, used for receiving and entertaining guests. 2. A periodic gathering of people of social or intellectual distinction. 3. A hall or gallery for the exhibition of works of art." Pretty impressive, but what does this have to do with Ice Dragon.

Two years ago, while running around working Ice Dragon as many in my Barony do I kept passing Baron Daniel Del Cavallo and his group entertaining in the loft area above the main floor of the Armory. They had a few tables, wonderful food, fine beverages and good friends enjoying the day and doing so in style and luxury. Leading into the next Ice Dragon I was asked what I thought was at the core of Ice Dragon. I thought back to my first event ever which was Ice Dragon back in 1998 and all the things that day that made me fall in love with the SCA. I thought of the next series of Ice Dragons I had attended and the image that popped into my head above all others was that group of people enjoying Ice Dragon in style up in the loft. Furthermore, during that year's Ice Dragon I stopped to observe in a small area of some twenty feet I could see a play being performed in front of the Ice Dragon Stage, Middle Eastern music and dancing being performed near by and then Baron Danny's group. I knew at that moment that even for just that small moment in time this was the swankiest place in all of Aethelmearc. This was what I loved about Ice Dragon. At the end of Ice Dragon last year I announced I was taking a year off and could be found up in the loft hosting my tables in the style of Baron Danny. However, nothing is ever that easy here in the Hael.

I thought I was taking this year off, but the Autocrat came to me and asked me to help organize some salon style suites in the style I was planning on emulating. Now it is apparent at this point I should repeat so there is no wide spread panic that there will be plenty of space, tables and seating at Ice Dragon that come with the price of admission. The Salons are offered to those that wish to engage in the period art of slightly nicer accommodations at the small price that extra luxury and style comes with. Did I mention that there would be plenty of other space; tables and seating that come with the price of admission.

We have fourteen salon spaces available. There will be ten in the loft and four down in the armored tournament areas. If you reserve a salon space you are also promising to make that space look posh, stylish and luxurious. Four of these spots have already been reserved. For the small luxury fee of ten dollars you get a ten-foot by ten-foot salon space. You may place anything in it to make it the envy of all who see it and to entertain in. If you put up a pavilion (pop up) please make sure you protect the floors of the hall with some type of padding and etcetera. We are renting tables for ten dollars each. You may not take tables from other parts of the hall as they are designated for other things including those that are not reserving a salon. You are welcome to bring tables from home. The table rental is just for your convenience and is not mandatory.

As a special added surprise, three special guest judges using various unannounced criteria will judge your salons. Our three special judges are Baroness Isolda, Baron Carolus and the inspiration of Ice Dragon Salons and the epitomy of style Baron Danny del Cavallo. If you decide to take on a Salon we strongly encourage you do your best to help make this the swankiest and most stylish corner of Aethelmearc ever.

Greetings from Aengus MacBain, A&S Competition Coordinator for this year's Ice Dragon

Ice Dragon will take place in the Rhydderich Hael (Buffalo NY) on March 24, 2012.

Entrants of all levels of skill and experience are welcome and encouraged to enter the A&S competition.

□ Entries in any category must have been completed within the past year.

For brewing entries the year starts at the time the beverage has completed fermentation per the recipe, and has sufficiently aged to allow the flavors to meld. When the entry becomes drinkable, the clock begins.

- The documentation should include the details of your process.

- Once a beverage has been entered it may not be entered in subsequent years.

□ Single item entries welcome. Entrants *do not* have to enter the Pentathlon.

Those wishing to enter the Pent must enter an item in at least 5 main categories.

□ Items may have been previously entered in a display or other competition, but winners of any Kingdom's A&S competition are not eligible to participate.

□ No kits please

□ You may cross enter, but there is a limit of two entries per item.

□ You may have only 2 entries in any main category.

 \Box Entry by proxy will be allowed.

- Early deadline for Literary Arts entries (research papers, musical composition, prose and poetry) Papers must be received electronically or postmarked by February 15, 2012
- Documentation must be authored by the entrant. That doesn't mean that the entrant can't receive feedback or typing assistance. It is acceptable to have your documentation proofread and seek typing/layout help.

Entrants will get to choose the depth of the commentary they receive. As an option to the traditional Ice Dragon critique, an option will be available for those who wish to receive light comments (Your choice will not affect your score).

There will be space for entrants to leave a note for the judges. They may ask a question about a problem they encountered, request sources for information or materials or even let the judges know it's their first time entering an A&S competition. It will not be required to leave any message in this area but it is hoped that entrants will choose to communicate with the judges in this way. The judges will use the information to better tailor their comments to the artisan.

3:00	All judging to be complete.	

Winners will be announced during Court. All entries must be picked up immediately after Court.

Sweet and Sour Fish Redaction by THFool Dagonell Collingwood

Original:

Egurdouce of Fysshe (From: A Forme of Cury, pg. 63) "Take Loch or Tench or Solys smyte hem on pecys. Fry he in oyle. take half wyne half vyneg and sug & make a siryp, do thto oynons icorue & raisons coranee, and grete raysons. do thto hole spices. gode powdos and salt. messe th fyfsh & lay th fewe aboue and sue forth."

Translation:

Sour-Sweet Fish

Take loch [a type of carp] or tench [another type of carp] or sole. Smite [break] them to pieces. Fry them in oil. Take half wine, half vinegar and sugar and make a syrup. Do thereto onions cores & currants and raisins. Do thereto whole spices, good powders [strong aromatic spices] and salt. Divide the fish and pour sauce about and serve it forth.

Redacted Recipe:

Sweet and Sour Fish			
1 c rice	2 c water		
1/2 large onion, diced	4 T olive oil		
2/3 lb frozen cod, defrosted	2 T brown sugar		
1/4 c whole wheat flour	1/4 t ground mace		
3/8 c apple cider vinegar	1/4 c raisins		
3/8 c white cooking wine	1/4 c currants		
1/4 t ground cloves	1/4 t ground allspice		

Put the rice and water in a pot to boil. Add cooking oil to a frying pan and start sautéing the onion. Break the fish into pieces and dredge in flour. (An easy-to-clean, simple, non-period way to do this; pour the flour into a one-gallon freezer bag. Dump in the fish. Seal. Shake.) When the onions are transparent, add the fish pieces (and simply toss the freezer bag). In a mixing bowl, combine the vinegar, wine, sugar, spices and fruit.

When the fish are brown, add the sweet and sour sauce. Reduce heat and simmer until the rice is done. Serve the fish and sauce over a bed of rice.



Carry My Lady to London by Dagonell the Juggler In this game two children cross hands, grasping each other's wrists and their own as well: they thus form a seat on which a third child can sit and be carried about. At the same time they sing the verses listed below.

This was more of a pastime than a game. It was non-competitive and there was no scoring. The idea was simply to see how far you could carry the third person. In medieval Germany, this game was also known as "Carrying Angels". The illustration is from Brueghel's painting, "Children's Games".

- "I. Give me a pin to stick in my thumb To carry my lady to London. Give me another to stick in my other To carry her a little bit farther.
- II. London Bridge is broken And what shall I do for a token? Give me a pin to stick in my thumb And carry my lady to London.
- III. Give me a pin to stick in my chin To Carry my lady to London London Bridge is broken down And I must let my lady down."
